DANEBO READING CIRCLE TOURS WITH *MISS ICELAND* IN APRIL

Sunday, April 18: 2pm

Miss Iceland, the most recent best-seller by Auður Ava Ólafsdóttir, follows Hekla from her rural home to Reykjavik in 1963 and later to Copenhagen, ever in pursuit of freedom—and of being a writer. The novel was published in 2018 in Iceland and translated into English in 2020 by Brian FitzGibbon. It is also the story of Hekla, named for the volcano, and Jon, her gay friend who is likewise searching for new life in the arts. The publisher describes the book as “a novel of extraordinary poise and masterful acuity from one of our most celebrated Icelandic writers.” Join the reading group via Zoom—or outside at the DAC if factors permit—on Sunday, April 18. Katy Lindblad will lead the discussion beginning at 2 PM.

Many of the characters in *Miss Iceland*, especially the females, find life constraining and their choices limited, from work options to their inclusion in literary and artistic culture. Expectations are tradition-bound and seem stifling. But as the world of the 1960s is changing, Hekla and Jon wonder how it will affect them and their homeland. Will role expectations change? Does acceptance become broader? Is a beauty pageant a celebration of femininity or a scam? Are sex and love between men and women mutually exclusive? Whose artistic work is visible—or invisible—and who decides? Do victims of discrimination suffer equally? And what is in a name? Author Ólafsdóttir, her characters, and the readers of *Miss Iceland* explore these questions and more.

In May the Reading Circle follows another artist, this time aspiring Norwegian painter Alberta, now in Paris. *Alberta and Freedom* (1931, 237 pages) is the middle book in The Alberta Trilogy by Norwegian author Cora Sandel and translated into English in 1963 by Elizabeth Rokkan. Over the course of the three books, Alberta grows from a stifled, rebellious girl in far northern Tromsø to an impoverished young woman following her muse in Paris to a middle-aged divorcée back in her homeland bound to achieve self-sufficiency as an author. A Library Journal review characterized the trilogy as “a magnificent work of introspection” and “a moving story, a familiar classic of Norwegian literature, and a prize to be translated for the American people.” Come discuss the story of this intriguing woman on Sunday, May 16, at 2pm.

I KØKKENET

Shrimp and Leek Quiche

Crust (18 cm/7 in pan)

150 grams flour

50 grams margarine/butter

Mix flour and margarine with a little cold water. Prebake for 10 minutes at 220°C /425°F

Filling

200 g salad shrimp and chopped leeks

(can substitute or any other meat and vegetables)

2 deciliters cream

200 grams shredded cheese

3 eggs

Pinch of nutmeg

Put shrimp and leeks in the crust. Whip cream, eggs, and nutmeg. Pour over ingredients in the crust. Add cheese on top. Bake at 200°C /400°F for 35-45 minutes.

THE BEST OF DANISH CINEMA IS ONLINE

Alamo Drafthouse Cinema is proud to announce the next series in a year-long partnership between the Alamo On Demand VOD platform and the Danish Film Institute with the support of the Ministry of Culture and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Denmark.

The Best of Danish Cinema series features 36 films in total, rolled out in thematic “six packs” the last Thursday of every other month. In addition to the 36 featured films, Alamo is also curating one of the largest collections of Danish films on the planet, many exclusive to Alamo on Demand. The “six-pack” just released celebrates the distinctly Danish film movement/manifesto Dogme 95 that burst forth from Danish auteurs Thomas Vinterberg and Lars Von Trier in 1995. Their idea was a “purification” of cinema, stripping away the artifice, technology, and, very pointedly, big studio influence. With no gimmicks, no post-production, no special effects, no sets, no soundtrack, and no artificial lighting, Dogme 95 films were intended to be a pure expression of the art of storytelling. Only a scant 31 films from 1998 to 2005 are officially recognized Dogme 95 films; the movement “disbanded” in 2005. But the influence, ideas and philosophy influenced countless filmmakers in the movement’s wake and helped to reshape the aesthetic of modern independent cinema.

The two centerpiece films are the first two films of the movement, directed by the founders of the movement: Thomas Vinterberg’s THE CELEBRATION and Lars Von Trier’s THE IDIOTS. THE IDIOTS, THE CELEBRATION and Dogme 95 #18 TRULY HUMAN are exclusively available on Alamo on Demand.

Anyone who watches all 36 films in the Alamo Drafthouse Cinema “Best of Danish Cinema” series will be invited to a “Meet the Danes” party in Los Angeles or New York. Dates and details will be announced later, when gathering and parties don’t sound like alien concepts. Huge thanks to our partners at the Danish Film Institute for making this celebration possible.

DENMARK’S QUEEN MARGRETHE TO SKIP BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS FOR SECOND YEAR

Once again this year, Her Majesty The Queen’s birthday on 16 April will be marked differently than usual. Like last year, The Queen will spend the day at Fredensborg Palace, where the birthday will be celebrated privately.

When Her Majesty The Queen turned 80 years old almost a year ago, the day turned out to be different than planned. In light of the situation with COVID-19 in the Danish society, the round birthday was celebrated at Fredensborg Palace with digital congratulations from inside Denmark and abroad, joint singing and Her Majesty’s address to the Danish people in the evening. One year later, the situation with COVID-19 continues to mean that The Queen’s birthday must be celebrated differently than the traditional way. Her Majesty and the royal family will therefore not come out on the balcony during the changing of the guard at Amalienborg at 12:00 noon this year. Instead, The Queen will celebrate the day privately at Fredensborg Palace.

However, it will still be possible to send The Queen a birthday greeting via the Royal Danish House’s digital platforms. On the morning of 16 April, a congratulations list will be set up on the Royal Danish House’s website (kongehuset.dk), where it will be possible to send personal felicitations to The Queen. Due to the continued spread of COVID-19, it will not be possible to show up physically at Det Gule Palæ at Amalienborg to handwrite a greeting for Her Majesty. The birthday will be marked throughout the day on the Royal Danish House’s social media and website.

DANISH AUTHOR LOUIS JENSEN DIES

If you've ever been in the dining room at the Danish American Center, you've most likely seen and read the panels on the walls which contain the short stories of Louis Jensen. Sadly, he recently died suddenly at the age of 77. When he last communicated in January with his translator Lisa Kildegaard, he was full of news about new books he was writing and new adventures. They were planning to meet and collaborate in the fall. Here is a translation of the 334th story from his 1001 square story project—a small sample of his lyricism and his wild imagination.
