It is time to place your order for our imported Danish cheeses, leverpostej and asier. The selection is the same as last year, and, can you believe it, the prices are the same. Our members can order:

Leverpostej (Liver pate) Large loaf \$10, small loaf \$5 Asier (Danish pickled cucumber strips) 1 Qt glass \$7 Creamy Havarti Cheese, \$7.30/lb

Caraway Havarti sold in 8oz packages at \$4.15/each.

Aged Havarti Cheese, \$9.60/lb

Fontina Cheese, \$8.60/lb

Danish Blue, 4.4oz wedge, \$3.50 each

Orders for Creamy Havarti and Fontina must be in 10lb, 5lb or 2.5lb, and orders for

Aged Havarti must be in 3.5lb or 1.75lb.

Weight of cheese is approximate, price is per pound. The blue cheese is sold in pre-packaged 4.4oz wedges. Leverpostej and Asier are made by our own Svea Ernst, and the cheeses are imported from Denmark.

SELECTIONS FROM THE COLLECTION

The DAC's art collection is comprised of varied mediums representing 150 years of collecting and gifts. A new exhibit showing the range of works has just been installed in the first-floor art gallery, and it will remain on view through 2021. You can see Danish travel posters, 19th century maps of Copenhagen and Denmark, landscape paintings and lithography, watercolors and photos. All works have a connection to Denmark and are by Danish and Danish American artists, including current members Rene Paulsen, Gitte Mohr and Susan Loschenkohl. Others are by former residents of Danebo. Subjects range from Bjørn Wiinblad to the Kings and Queens of Denmark, from sea scapes to the Hartz mountains where the Sankt Hans witch flies off to and from a realistic 19th century view of herding cows on a hot summer day to a 20th century bright and colorful abstract work by Vibeke Joan Andersen titled "Now came the Beautiful Summer." There is something for everyone's taste and interests.

RESOURCE CENTER

Our library, located on the first floor, is open on Wednesdays and other times when the building is open. Julianne Haahr and Jytte Svarre have been our library committee for several years and are ready to step back and let others take this role. LEIF 2021 CELEBRATES ALL THINGS NORDIC IN OCTOBER

For 13 days in October, a variety of events will explore, discover, and celebrate the cultures of six Nordic peoples on both sides of the Atlantic. The Leif Eriksson International Festival (LEIF) is sponsored by Mindekirken, the Norwegian Memorial Lutheran Church (924 East 21st Street, Minneapolis) and organized by a committee of representatives from the Minnesota Danish, Icelandic, Finnish, Norwegian, Sámi, and Swedish communities. Suzanne Jebe and Leo Lake are our envoys to this group. As of this writing, plans are going ahead for a hybrid schedule of in-person and online events, but the COVID-19 situation seems to be changing daily and so may the actual details of the LEIF 2021 program. All of the events on the schedule will take place, but please check the website (leifmn.org) to be sure whether the in-person events will still be at Mindekirken or moved online.

Tuesday, October 5, 11am: Tuesday Open House. Live at Mindekirken with Virtual Program from Norway: *Sylvsmidja* – *Traditional Silver Jewelry*. The program is co-sponsored by Norway House, which is hosting a display of photos and silver objects from this well-known company. The in-person program features lunch, an Intro to LEIF by newly-arrived Mindekirken pastor Gunnar Kristiansen and greetings from Honorary Norwegian Consul Eivind J. Heiberg. The Destination of the Day links on the LEIF website will feature Norway and Norwegian America.

Wednesday, October 6: *Destination of the Day* is a video tour of eight Nordic paintings hosted by Mary Jo Thorsheim, owner and founder of Norway Art, located at Norway House. The 37-minute YouTube video, available on leifmn. org throughout the festival, features two Danish artists: Antonio Jacobsen and Lauritz A. Ring. Later *Destination of the Day* links will connect to all the artists.

Tuesday, October 12, 11am: Tuesday Open House at Mindekirken with virtual program from Norway: Pastor Rolf Steffensen speaking on Shamanism and the Christian Faith. The food focus at the lunch (video demonstration if online) is finnbiff. Come (tune in) and værsågod!

DANEBO READING CIRCLE

Sunday, October 17: 2pm

On Sunday, September 19, the Danebo Reading Circle met in person in the Third Floor Conference Room at the DAC. Due to distance or other reasons, some members joined via Zoom or telephone. This hybrid approach will probably continue for the foreseeable future, unless COVID-19 forces us all back online.

At that meeting we welcomed a new member, Marie Thorsten, and had a lively discussion led by Gitte Mohr of *The Exception* by Danish author Christian Jungersen. Everyone agrees that it is a real page-turner!

In October, our selection is Swedish author Sofia Lundberg's The Red Address Book (2015/2017, 290 pages; translated in 2019 by Alice Menzies). The address book is owned by 96-year-old Doris and is a record of all the people she has met since she received the book on her tenth birthday from her father. Now many of the names have had a line drawn through them as people die or fall out of contact. Doris's own family has shrunk down to one grandniece, Jenny, in the USA. As the two enjoy Skype conversations between Stockholm and San Francisco, Doris relives her life and shares family stories with Jenny. Reviewers have described the book as "sweet, sad, and sentimental...but a little melodramatic," "quite lovely and nostalgic," "somber and melancholic... also love and uplifting," and "a nostalgic and tender story with more than a few pearls of wisdom." Many commentators compared the author to Fredrik Backman and one declared: "Sofia Lundberg's Doris squirmed her way into my heart." Julie Robbins will lead our discussion on Sunday, October 17.

The final meeting of the year will be on Sunday, November 21, when we will discuss the classic Danish novel, *The Fall of the King* (1901, 273 pages; translated by Alan G. Bower), by Johannes V. Jensen. We will also receive the 2022 schedule of books, following voting in October.
