Please send a clear copy. Do not send any original documents. DAC cannot be responsible for original documents. Documents can be sent via a picture file, a scanned document, or a Word file. The documents will be reviewed, and the translators will determine if it is material that can be translated. Work will be returned by email. The rate is \$30 per hour for members and \$40 per hour for non-members. Payments can be made by check to the Danish American Center. Translated documents will be returned to you by mail. DANEBO READING CIRCLE ANTICIPATES *SUMMER LIGHT AND SUMMER BREAK*

Sunday, May 21: 2pm

This month's hybrid meeting on Sunday, May 21, will bring book lovers together at the DAC and on Zoom for what will undoubtedly be a lively discussion of Jón Kalman Stefánsson's 2006 novel, *Summer Light, and Then Comes the Night*. The meeting begins at 2pm with discussion leader Myra Madsen, who has prepared this introduction.

Jón Kalman Stefánsson (1963-) is an Icelandic author whose novels have been nominated three times for the Nordic Council Prize for Literature. His novel *Summer Light, and Then Comes the Night* (2005, 2020; 249 pages) received the Icelandic Prize for Literature. In addition to a trilogy—*Heaven and Hell*, *The Sorrow of Angels*, and *The Heart of Man*—he wrote *Fish Have No Feet* (2018), which was longlisted for the Man Booker International Prize. *Summer Light, and Then Comes the Night* was translated into English in 2020 by Philip Roughton, an award-winning translator of Icelandic literature.

Summer Light, and Then Comes the Night is set in a fictional, unnamed "village of just four hundred souls, around 500 more in the surrounding countryside." Due to an improved highway, the village is now a mere two-hour drive north of Reykjavik. The village, naturally, has an array of colorful characters, including a first-person, omniscient narrator who speaks for the village itself, functioning as a Greek chorus might in a drama by Sophocles or Euripides. However, Greek choruses tend to be gender-neutral, whereas the voice here is certainly masculine.

This work is a fascinating hybrid of a novel and a series of eight interlinking short stories. Certain plot lines and characters flit through the book, such as the possibility of the Depot being haunted by the ghosts of the people murdered on a farm previously at this location. There is the former business executive, now called the Astronomer, who starts dreaming in Latin; the postmistress, Ágústa, who reads other people's mail; the local beauty and restaurateur, Elísabet, who waits years for her true love to return to Iceland. A farmer, Benedikt, resurfaces in the narrative to star in the final devastating story. These and other storylines pulse with undercurrents of humor, love, and lust.

Stefánsson is very good at characterization and plot, although he gives his narrator space to step aside from those elements to comment on any number of topics: time, technology, animals, music, outer space, travel, and world affairs. He has published three books of poetry and has stated, "I'm writing words as well as music with language." Elements of his poetic focus are evident in *Summer Light and Then Comes the Night*.

The book group will take the summer off from meeting but will surely be exploring many literary and other pursuits. Top of the list might be the three books for the last part of the year: *Ice* by Finnish/Swedish author Ulla-Lena Lundberg (2012, 2016 translation by Thomas Teal; 441 pages) for September; the beginning of *Lucky Per* by Denmark's Henrik Pontoppidan (1904, 2019; 300 pages) in a new English translation by Naomi Lebowitz scheduled for October; and Norwegian author Karl Ove Knausgård's work of criticism and memoir, *So Much Longing in So Little Space: The Art of Edvard Munch* (2017, 2019 translation by Ingvild Burkey; 233 pages) in November. Members will also be working toward the September 1 deadline for submitting suggestions for the 2024 set of titles. Voting in October will winnow the nominations down to eight books.

As always, everyone is welcome to join the Reading Circle at any time. All *DANews* readers are also eligible to submit ideas for the 2024 selections. The main criteria are that books be by a Nordic author, have been translated into English, and are readily available in libraries or for purchase. Books by English-language authors that feature a strong connection to Denmark are also eligible for consideration. A nomination form is available. 
Not quite ready to go overnight yet? We are also offering a special \$100 scholarship to attend the Danish Day Adventure Day Camp Session.
