MUSIC ON THE MISSISSIPPI

Two successful Music on the Mississippi concerts occurred in June and July. In June, Maryann Sullivan and



the Moneymakers treated us to the music of Duke Ellington. Maryann specifically highlighted tunes sung by Ivie Anderson, Duke's vocalist from 1930 to 1942. Many of these are now part of the Great American Songbook and recognized by most of us. Her Moneymakers group consisted of four top local jazz musicians with Phil Aaron on piano, Doug Haining on reeds, Tom Lewis on bass and Trevor Haining on drums.

Karrin Allyson, headlining our July show, sold out several weeks ahead of time. Karrin resides in New York City and performs



in top jazz clubs in the U.S. She has produced 15 albums since the early '90s, five of which received Grammy nominations. Karrin's trio included our own Will Kjeer on piano and local, sought-after bassist Jay Young. Her set list was eclectic and included her own tunes to Brazilian. A fun duo was performed with Linda Peterson, who was in the audience. Linda is a DAC member and performed a concert of her own in January.

Patty Peterson, Linda's sister and well-known local vocalist is set to play a concert on Thursday, October 19th.

DANEBO READING CIRCLE

Sunday, September 17: 2pm

After a summer of sun, heat, and probably some books, the Danebo Reading Circle is set to finish the year before diving into the winter holidays. All are welcome!

On Sunday, September 17, a hybrid meeting on the third floor at DAC and on Zoom will bring members together to discuss *Ice* by Finland/Swedish author Ulla-Lena Lundberg (2012, 436pp). This intriguing novel, described on the back cover as an "epic of island life that has gripped Finland," was copyrighted in English in 2016 by Thomas Teal, the well-known translator of Tove Jansson's work. Following the completion of a Master's Degree in 1985, author Lundberg spent one academic year (1986-1987) as a lecturer and writer in residence at the University of Minnesota.

From Wikipedia: "Lundberg's Swedish-language novel *Ice* was awarded the Finlandia Prize, Finland's most prestigious literary award, in 2012. With domestic sales of almost 150,000 copies, it has become one of the most cherished Finnish novels of the decade. Partly based on the life of Lundberg's own family on the isolated island of Kökar, *Ice* has attracted much interest from theatres, but the [Finnish National Opera](#) was the first to get permission to adapt it for the stage. The libretto follows the key events and characters of the rich novel, with music that rings with the changing seasons and the ever-present threat of ice."

The residents of the vicarage - Petter, Mona, daughters Sanne and Lillus - and the other inhabitants of the Örand Islands constitute a memorable community. There is no designated discussion leader this month, so members are encouraged to bring topics and questions to share with the group. This should not be difficult because the book "has everything: drama, humour, searching questions about life and death, vivid characters, and full-blown portraits of nature, all of it written with glowing expressive elegance." (Egil Green, *Borgåbladet*)

The book for the October 15 meeting is the beginning of *Lucky Per* by Denmark's Nobel-Prize-winning Henrik Pontoppidan (1904, 2010; through page 331) in the first English translation by Naomi Lebowitz. If Books 1-5 of this masterpiece prove enjoyable, the group will schedule the remaining books (through page 599) in 2024. Discussion leader Marie Thorsten describes the book as a smooth, enjoyable read. She adds: "I hope everyone reads the Knopf

Everyman's Library edition from 2019, featuring the 2010 translation by Naomi Lebowitz. This edition has a timeline and a lot of extras. There is another translation from 2018 by [Paul Larkin](#) titled "A Fortunate Man" (same title as the film) but it seems to be obscure and very expensive.

"The protagonist, Per, has much in common with the author as well as Denmark itself at the debut of late 19th-century modernity. Ambitious young people in Copenhagen question the religious, philosophical, and artistic sensibilities of their forbears and hope to advance monumental engineering projects elevating Denmark into the society of great nations. Folk in the countryside, however, become poorer, with no "decisive break with the past," convinced of their essence as "the marrow of the nation [and] united in a glorious cultivation of butter and pork" (p. 262). Luck itself is a main factor helping Per achieve his "great work," but does he become a better man because of his fortune? And is luck something that happens through chance, or must it also be cultivated and engineered?"

Looking ahead to the final session of the year, readers will want to check out Norwegian author Karl Ove Knausgård's *So Much Longing in So Little Space* (2017, 2019 translation by Ingvild Burkey, 233pp). This is both a book of criticism and a memoir as he reflects on the art of fellow countryman Edvard Munch. Knausgård concentrates on Munch's landscapes and includes interviews with other contemporary artists. According to Wikipedia, some people "consider him the greatest Norwegian writer since playwright Henrik Ibsen."

BONE FLUTES IN DENMARK, A VIKING CONNECTIONS APPRENTICESHIP

In my Nordic musical life, nothing has been more fascinating to me than *natureinstrumenter* - nature instruments. Made only from materials found in nature, these instruments are sometimes ephemeral, like blades of grass or willow bark tubes. Sometimes they are sturdier like *beinfløyte*, *knoglefløjte*, - bone flute. Bone flutes are the most common instrument found in Medieval, Viking, and Anglo-Saxon archeological contexts. The oldest known bone flute was made from a cave bear femur in the Paleolithic.

I applied for the Viking Connections Apprenticeship program (<https://www.vikingconnection.org>) for this Iron Age study. In May I headed off on my first trip to Denmark! I chose to learn from Danish musician Aksel Striim, renowned in the Viking-era music community for his nature instrument-making and playing. I traveled to the EcoVillage in Hjortshøj outside of Aarhus to learn from the best.

The majority of flutes were made from sheep tibias. The first workday was all about boiling bones. Then we made the mouthpiece end smooth with a file. Then we made the "air ramp." Aksel did not speak a lot of English and I don't speak any Danish and don't know the parts of flutes in English, so we had fun with naming things. After the bones are clean and smooth and the air ramp is made it was time to make the "wind canal."

We plugged the blowing end with a combination of beeswax and violin bow rosin, it would have been crushed amber in the Iron Age. We had to work quickly to create the wind canal in the soft beeswax with a small file. This took many tries. Form it, blow, re-form it, blow...until we got a nice tone from the bone. After that, it was time to make the finger holes.

I found out that you put the finger holes in a comfortable place for your particular fingers. In the Iron Age, they didn't know about Middle-C or keys or sharps or flats. Old Norse didn't even have a word for "music" the way we think of it today. But if you want the flute to sound like a major or minor scale, you make the holes larger to make the tone higher and "tune" it by fixing the holes just right.

Last November when I told Aksel that I got the funding I figured we would work with sheep bones and hoped we could use other bones too, especially swan. Swans have a special place in Norse mythology. On the second day, I was handed a plastic bag from Aksel's freezer containing the two wings of a swan.

There I was with the swan wings I had hoped for. Fortunately, I had dealt with goose wings before and was undaunted. Stripping the skin with feathers attached from the bones was easy with my new knife. Finally, I got them separated and we cut the ends off and started boiling. I made two finger-hole flutes from the ulnas and an overtone flute from a radius.

In a week I made four sheep bone flutes, three swan bone flutes, two lake reed flutes, an elder branch flute and I mounted a sharp knife into a handle. Aksel taught me so much - even a Danish tune called "Jeg gik mig ud." I will need help with the Danish pronunciation. It was an amazing experience, and I am so happy to share it.

MEDISTERPØLSE SAUSAGE MAKING CLASS

Saturday, November 18: 9:30am

For many Danes, the Juleaften's meal is not complete without a serving of medisterpølser. The DAC is holding a class for members and their guests, on Saturday, November 18th in the DAC dining room so you can make your own! We'll meet from 9:30am until we're all stuffed (the casings, not us.)

The cost is \$35 for members and \$45 for non-members and a per-pound price for the pork (to be determined, usually about \$4 per pound). Spices, casings, onions, and broth are provided.

If you'd like to participate, please call Tina Paulsen at the office 612- 729-3800 or email dainfo@dac.mn. Please provide your name, phone number, email and most important, how many pounds of medisterpølse you'd like to take home.

The class size will be limited to 18. This class fills quickly and will be filled on a first-come first-served basis.

This year you will be able to sample Medisterpølse, red cabbage, and fried potatoes.

The deadline for ordering is November 5th to give the butcher sufficient time to ground the pork. The recipe is written as 5 pounds of meat, so ordering in increments of 5 pounds make life simpler. You'll need to bring bowl(s) big enough to hold all of your raw meat. Make them large enough that you can add spices and broth and mix without sloshing over the edge. You will need a knife for mincing onions and bring your cutting board if you don't want to share. An apron is also a good idea.

Hope you'll join us! Bring your checkbook.

NEWS FROM DENMARK

DANISH CYCLIST JONAS VINGEGAARD WINS TOUR DE FRANCE FOR 2ND YEAR IN A ROW

Denmark's Jonas Vingegaard (riding for UCI WorldTeam Team Jumbo-Visma) won the yellow jersey as the overall winner of the 2023 Tour de France. The 26-year-old won the Tour for the second straight season, becoming the 21st rider in history to win the race multiple times.
