NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

As the summer winds down, our focus turns to a new season. This fall is shaping up to be very active at the DAC, and we are excited about all of our upcoming events!

Plans are being made for the upcoming DAC Annual Meeting. It will be held on September 21, and we will get a chance to discuss the current state of DAC activities, finances, and property. We will also be electing new board members. Please mark your calendar for this event and we look forward to seeing you!

At the August board meeting, we discussed a number of ongoing business items. Our fundraising efforts are continuing for the coming year, including the popular cheese sale. We also anticipate more social gatherings both on site at DAC and the offsite happy hours which have become notably popular.

A minor building maintenance issue turned into a larger problem when we had a water pipe burst on the first floor in July. The cleanup has been successful, but this has expedited our plan to rebuild the suite on the first floor and install the two new bathrooms that have been planned. We will also be conducting a lot of building

This tapestry was created by a community in southern Iceland, and the art depicts a famous Viking-era Icelandic Saga. It took seven years to create and was made using traditional methods. I am grateful that we as an organization have the opportunity to host special events like this! This is yet another way for us to celebrate our Viking heritage.

As always, I am grateful to all the volunteers and members in this organization who keep things running. Thank you for your support, and I look forward to seeing many of you at the annual meeting in September!

COMMUNITY IMPACT AWARD LORAIN JENSEN

Every year we open nominations for Dane of the Year to our members and we have so many worthy candidates, it is hard to choose. This year we decided to add a new award to recognize not only members who make a great contribution to DAC through Dane of the Year, but also those who make an impact in the community at large.



Loraine's family background is thoroughly Danish. Her mother grew up around Harlan and Elk Horn, Iowa, and her father moved from Tomah, Wisconsin, to Elk Horn after high school to work as a farmhand for a relative, where he met Loraine's mother. They were married in the Elk Horn Lutheran Church, and then moved to a farm in Nebraska where Loraine grew up. She has lived most of her adult life in Alexandria, Minnesota. She is the founder, former president, and now Executive Director, of the American Association for Runic Studies. She established this nonprofit organization after earning a Master's in Public Affairs degree from the Humphrey Institute at the University of Minnesota. In 2017, Loraine began leading groups on periodic "Rune Rounds"—and has led groups to Scandinavia. These field trips allow rune enthusiasts (sometimes playfully called runatics) to view runestones in remote rural settings as well as museum collections.

Loraine also has close professional ties with other runologists in northern Europe, and she has established connections with experts in related fields, such as Viking-era archaeology, art history, and geology. Also, she is well connected with museum specialists in Scandinavia.

She makes presentations about runestones to various organizations. Her talks are so inviting, and include interesting facts: For example, she takes great delight in describing the origin of the wireless technology Bluetooth, as it refers back to 10th century Danish king Harold Bluetooth, and the Bluetooth icon combines two runic letters! Her greatest gift is her ability to present scholarly information to a general public and get them excited about our Nordic heritage. In short, Loraine has single-handedly had a tremendous impact on the field of Runology, a realm that is so far-reaching and consequential to all of us who treasure our Scandinavian cultural heritage.

GREENLAND PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE

Greenland is the world's largest island, mostly covered by ice, but it is front and center on today's world stage. Over the course of about 4,000 years, it was settled by peoples from North America and Siberia, crossing on the frozen Thule Strait, and later by the Norse (Vikings). Today's population is about 56,000. For many years part of the kingdom of Denmark, Greenland acquired Home Rule in 1959. While seal and whale hunting remain vital to the indigenous peoples and fishing is a major industry, today's attention is on the mineral riches of the island, its strategic position vis à vis the US, and the new shipping routes opening up as Arctic ice melts. THE DANEBO READING CIRCLE GEARS UP FOR FALL 2025

With summer winding down, all thoughts turn to autumn, usually a spectacular season in Minnesota. In addition to fall colors and holidays, Danebo Reading Circle members are looking forward to three more book discussions to wind up 2025. They will also be submitting final nominations and choosing titles for the 2026 calendar.

This month the group will meet on Sunday, September 21, for a return favorite, *Out Stealing Horses*, by Per Petterson (NO, Oslo: Forlaget Oktober, 2003, 258 pages; translated by Anne Born, New York: Picador, 2005). The meeting will begin at 1 pm and end by 3 pm, in time for the DAC Annual Meeting (3 pm) that day. It will follow the usual hybrid format with members meeting on the third floor of the DAC and also on Zoom. The October 19 and November 16 hybrid meetings will run 2-4 pm.

One of the several publishers of this work is Minnesota's Graywolf Press. A staff member who has worked with author Petterson has been invited to attend the meeting. In preparation, September discussion leader Roger McKnight offers these insights and questions about this award-winning novel:

"The Picador introduction to Per Petterson's 2003 Norwegian novel *Out Stealing Horses* (Ut og stjaele hester) describes it as 'the story of Trond Sander, a sixty-seven-year-old man who has moved from the city to a remote, riverside cabin, only to have all the turbulence, grief, and overwhelming beauty of his youth come back to him.' Those words accurately describe much of what first-person narrator Trond discovers (or rediscovers) about his youth, especially the years of World War II and the Nazi occupation of Norway. The aging Trond's memories of long-ago youthful awakenings abound. Who were his Norwegian neighbors in the 1940s and what were their traits and secrets? How did Norwegian adults conduct themselves under German rule in the 1940s? Was Sweden truly the youthful Trond's first foreign experience or was foreignness some other construct? What was Trond's true relationship with his own parents? And with the grown men and women around him? What was the nature of Trond's own sexual awakening? Why were there no girls his own age present? Where did his own father go? How does Trond as a teenager come to realize that we ourselves must

decide when and how deeply our pain will hurt? And what was all that seemingly meaningless talk of shooting dogs and stealing horses about—poignant, sentimental memories from the past or a momentous passcode?

"These questions, and others as well, can all be answered—or at least debated. However, they present an even larger question, which the narrator is largely silent about: Why? What was Trond's life history between the ages of 15 and 67? What did he make happen during those 52 years? Or what happened to him? And what's hidden behind the silence? Can we speculate?"

The October selection is *The Old Man and His Sons* (*Fedgar á ferð*) by Heðin Brú (Faroes: Vardín, 1940, and Sprotin, 2012; translated by John F. West, New York: Paul S. Eriksson, 1970, and London: Telegram, 2011, 166 pages). Chosen by the Faroese as their "Book of the Twentieth Century," the novel is the work of an author and translator deemed to be their most important writer of his generation: Hans Jacob Jacobsen (1901-1989, pen name: Heðin Brú), known for his fresh and ironic style.

Beginning in 1941 and then between 1962 and 1977, it was translated into nine languages, starting with Icelandic, Danish, Norwegian, West German, Greenlandic, English, Polish, East German, and Swedish. It was Heðin's first book translated into English. In 10 chapters, readers come to know Ketil, his wife, youngest son Kálvur, and other family members; residents of the village of Seyrvágur, older and younger generations, fisherfolk clinging to ancient ways, and townsfolk turning to clerical and commercial trades. Michelle Potter-Bacon is October's discussion leader.

For the last meeting of the year, in November, Lillian Jensen will join members via Zoom from her home in California to lead the group in discussing *Animal Life* by Auður Ava Ólafsdóttir (IS: Benedikt, 2020, 192 pages; translated by Brian FitzGibbon, New York: Black Cat [Grove Atlantic], 2022). The action of this novel takes place during December, so it is a perfect prelude to the pending holidays.

ADVANCED DANISH DISCUSSION AND CULTURE CLASS

Join a group of advanced language and culture learners for a discussion based on Danish author, Susanne V. Knudsen's book, *Grandmother's Universe* (Farmers verden). This class is for people with a solid Danish language foundation, who are interested in expanding their knowledge of the language, while diving into the challenging and harsh life of rural Denmark from 1880 to 1940. The class will move slowly through the chapters following student language levels. Danish-born instructor Niels Billund has been teaching, tutoring and playing music for a number of years in the Twin Cities, including a stint at Skovsøen. If the answer is *Nej*, join us for Beginner 1, a Danish language course. This is a slower-paced course for beginner-level students using the textbook *Colloquial Danish* for adult learners. We cover core basic language skills in everyday scenarios with plenty of grammar lessons and opportunities to practice with audio and written assignments in the textbook, and hands-on group work in class.

The course meets for ten sessions at the Danish American Center and two optional Zoom 'office hour' sessions where students may check in with questions about the lesson or homework assignment. Google Classroom is used for communication and classwork.

LEAVES FROM THE LIBRARY

During summer, we received many English-language books, as well as a large number of Danish-language ones. Most are still "in process" but here are a few fun titles. Two well-researched children's classics by American author Nora Burglon, 1896-1976:

Sticks Across the Chimney: A Story of Denmark tells the story of a single mom and her two children and their resourcefulness as they struggle to overcome hardships while living on an abandoned farm in rural Denmark. Excitement comes their way when a mound on the property is excavated, but what is inside? Ages 8-12

Nissernes hemmelige bog by Wil Nguyen is a beautifully illustrated account of the life and work of gnomes, based on first-hand observations by the author and artist who, themselves, turned into gnomes, and visited with gnomes in Lapland and Siberia. (In Danish)

Learn a new hobby! Beautiful books about the art of paper cutting, H.C. Andersen's beloved pastime. Check the online catalog for additional paper cutting titles:
