NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

We are living in a time of great uncertainty in this city and country. Many of our accepted norms have been upended, and this has created an environment of anxiety and fear.



I'm writing this in the wake of the tragic confrontation in South Minneapolis, where a neighbor citizen was killed by an agent of the federal government. Our hearts go out to the families involved, and we expect that at the end of the day, justice will be served.

In addition to this local event, we have all been watching the developments surrounding Greenland and the political rhetoric that is increasingly hostile towards the Danish territory. The DAC has been asked by several international media outlets for comments and perspective. The board leadership has also been asked by members to consider taking a stance regarding these current events. The Executive Committee crafted the following statement, which may also be published elsewhere in this issue of *DANEWS*: *The Danish American Center is a non-political, cultural organization dedicated to education, heritage, and dialogue. While*

we recognize the strong interest surrounding current events involving the United States, Denmark, and Greenland, our role is to foster understanding through history, culture, and people-to-people connections rather than political advocacy. We remain committed to creating a welcoming space for respectful learning and conversation grounded in shared values and mutual respect.

Our organization, by definition, is sympathetic to new immigrants to the United States. Over 100 years ago, the DAC was founded by Danish immigrants, with the goal to celebrate and share our Danish values of fellowship, community, sharing, and collaboration. We continue these traditions today. We enjoy our Danish festivities, traditional food and drink, and many of our members spend time at the DAC learning about their family histories. In summary, our organization is comprised of immigrants and descendants of immigrants, and we want to see all immigrants treated with dignity, fairness, and legal due process.

As we continue to move forward, I am confident that the DAC can continue to serve as a venue for discussion, fellowship, and learning. Our members span multiple generations, and it's incumbent on us to listen and engage with each other in a respectful manner. We have much that we can continue to learn from each other. This is also uncharted territory for the City of Minneapolis, and our organization can hopefully serve as a beacon of fellowship, trust, and comfort not only to our members but our neighbors and city at large.

DANEBO READING CIRCLE STAYS UP NORTH

Sunday, February 15: 1-3pm

This month the Danish Reading Circle remains in Iceland, reading *The Fish Can Sing (Brekkukotsannáll)*, a novel by Halldór Laxness (IS); 1957, 288 pages; translated into English by Magnús Magnússon (@1966), Havrill Press, 2000.

Two years after receiving the Nobel Prize, Laxness published this coming-of-age novel about a young boy in the early years of the 20th century. Abandoned by his mother, Álfgrímur grows up with loving foster grandparents in a cottage named Brekkukot on the outskirts of Reykjavik. Foster grandfather Björn works as a fisherman, never demanding more money for his goods than he needs to survive, and lives values like integrity, humility, and charity without making a show of it.

At Brekkukot, Björn helps all kinds of people in turmoil, and large parts of the book deal with Álfgrímur meeting Icelanders and some foreigners from all walks of life. A central character, Garðar Hólm, is allegedly a celebrated singer abroad and returns to Iceland several times. Although Álfgrímur is fascinated by the singer, he would be content to stay home and become a fisherman, but the grandfather knows that industrialized fishing will change the profession. Björn wants the youngster to get an education and is willing to sacrifice the past for Álfgrímur's future. *The Fish Can Sing* offers a painfully accurate portrait of life and its hardships in a rural Iceland that is about to disappear, engulfed by impending modernity. Álfgrímur's story reveals the classic confrontation between these two opposed concepts of the world. U.S. author Jane Smiley, in her introduction to the book, regards the two main characters as "the closest Laxness ever came to depicting himself." Appropriately, Smiley is the author of

the March 15 book: *The Greenlanders*, 1988, New York: Knopf, 558 pages.

A historical fiction bestseller, this lengthy saga is set in the 14th century, well after Icelandic explorers 'discovered' and then established a colony. The Plague rages in Europe while the influence of the Church wanes in the Greenland settlement. Lyrical prose describes human drama unfolding with the population cut off from the outside as they struggle to survive the often self-inflicted pain that arises in the harsh polar conditions. Smiley's epic novel spans 60 years, following two generations of Greenlanders through this period of isolation to the eventual dissolution of the settlement.

While working on her Ph.D. in English from the University of Iowa, where she later taught, Smiley was a Fulbright Scholar in Iceland. The author of many novels and other works, she won the 1992 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction for her novel *A Thousand Acres*, a modern-day retelling of *King Lear* set in rural Iowa.

LEAVES FROM THE LIBRARY

If you are a good Dane, I hope you remembered on 31 December at midnight precisely to stand on a chair and jump into the New Year for good luck. If you didn't, sorry, but you may have bad luck dogging you for the rest of the year! Although, if you twisted your ankle when you landed, that wouldn't be a promising indicator for the year, either.

I was reading about Danish festivals to mark seasons and special holidays. Like every other country, Denmark has its rituals. Typically in February there are carnivals celebrated in numerous ways, including Fastelavn, prior to the start of the 40 days of Lent. If you are an animal lover, you would have hated the historic cat-in-a-barrel Fastelavn event. The highlight was to put an innocent feline into a barrel, string it up, and have the locals beat the barrel until it broke, at which the traumatized wee animal escaped and was chased away (though I doubt it needed much chasing). The idea behind this was that the cat represented evil spirits, and the locals were seeing them off. Thought to have been brought to Denmark in the 1500s by Dutch immigrants, the last known live cat in a barrel was in the 1880s. Well, thank goodness times have changed! Modern Fastelavn has long been a children's event where they dress up in costumes and go door-to-door singing for candy or small change. Nowadays the barrel is like a piñata, filled with treats, though it usually still has a picture of a cat on the outside. Fun and family games are the order of the day, with no cats harmed.





DNA: ISSUES FOR SCANDINAVIAN-AMERICANS

Monday, February 23: 6:30pm via Zoom


DNA can be the key to breaking through many genealogical brick walls. But DNA can be a complicated source to use, and DNA research can pose special difficulties for Scandinavian researchers. This presentation will look at topics such as ethnicity estimates, endogamy, patronymics, and Scandinavian history.

We will look at the differences among the big four genealogical DNA companies (Ancestry, MyHeritage, FamilyTreeDNA, and 23andMe) including an examination of some of the best DNA analysis tools.

Our presenter, Bob Johnson, is a Certified Genealogist with over 50 years of experience. He specializes in Swedish, Finnish, Danish, and Norwegian genealogical research and has authored two books.

This event is provided free of charge courtesy of the National Danish-American Genealogical Society and is open to the public. No need to register, simply log on at the start time.
